An article about your favourite hobby

We can find articles in newspapers, magazines or on the Internet. In an article, we usually give an opinion or describe a person, a place, an event, an experience, etc. When we write an article for our school magazine, we usually use informal language. (see p. 48)

- Our articles should always have a short, but catchy title (Photography's Fun!).
- In the introduction, we introduce the topic and try to make our reader want to read more.
- In the main body, we write about our topic.
 Remember to start a new paragraph for each new idea (I-low I do my hobby one paragraph);
 why I like my hobby another paragraph).
- In the conclusion, we give our comments and feelings, and leave the reader with something to think about.

In the introduction and conclusion, we can use one of the following techniques:

- offer a general thought (Doing your favourite hobby is a great way to relax.)
- address the reader directly (Do you have a favourite hobby?)
- ask a rhetorical question (What can be better than a fun hobby?)

I like photography because you don't need a lot of equipment or organisation. You just need a good camera and a good eye! Another good


thing about it is that you can do it any time, anywhere! You don't have to join any clubs or do it at a special time or place.


I think photography is the perfect hobby for me. I think it's great just to pick up my







Writing Writing titles


