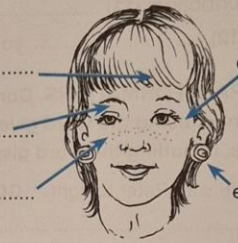

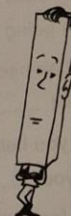

Appearance

beard (n): hair that grows on a man's cheeks and chin
γένια, μουσι
Father Christmas has a long, white beard.

casual (adj): not formal ανεπίσημος, πρόχειρος
The party will be in the garden, so wear casual clothes.

curly (adj): hair that is not straight σγουρός
She didn't like her curly hair and tried to comb it straight.

earring (n): jewellery worn on the ear σκουλαρική
She wore a pair of gold and diamond earrings.

eyebrow (n): line of hair that grows above the eye
φρύδι
The man looked angrily at us from under his thick eyebrows.

eyelash (n): one of the hairs growing along the eyelid
βλεφαρίδα
It can hurt if you get an eyelash in your eye.

freckle (n): a small, light brown mark on the skin
φακίδα
If I sit in the sun, I get lots of freckles on my face.

fringe (n): hair that hangs over one's forehead
φράντζα, αφέλεια (μαλλιών)
Your fringe is too long; it's hanging in your eyes.

loose (adj): not fitting close to the body φαρδύς
I prefer loose clothes for exercise, so I can move easily.

moustache (n): hair that grows above a man's upper lip μουστάκι
In Crete, many men have long black moustaches.

old-fashioned (adj): belonging to the style of the past
παλιμοδίτικος, ντεμοντέ
The clothes my grandmother wears are very old-fashioned.

overweight (adj): too heavy υπέρβαρος
My doctor says I'm overweight and must lose ten kilos.

slim (adj): thin in an attractive way λεπτός
She exercises every day to keep slim.

well-built (adj): having a strong, well-developed body
σωματώδης, γεροδεμένος
The well-built swimmer trained for hours each day.

well-dressed (adj): wearing smart clothes
καλοντυμένος
The well-dressed man is going to an important business meeting.

Character and Behaviour

amusing (adj): making you laugh or smile
διασκεδαστικός
Jackie loves to tell jokes and is very amusing.

bad-tempered (adj): gets angry easily οξύθυμος
Don't phone me too early; I am bad-tempered in the morning.

behave (v): to do or say things in a certain way
συμπεριφέρομαι
We teach our children to behave well when they go out.

confident (adj): sure of your abilities σίγουρος, με αυτοπεποίθηση
The student was confident about passing the exam.

encourage (v): to give support ενθαρρύνω
Good teachers encourage their students to develop their own talents.

generous (adj): giving freely to others γενναιόδωρος
It was very generous of your uncle to pay for your driving lessons.

honest (adj): truthful ειλικρινής
Be honest and tell me what you think of my new shirt.

independent (adj): not needing help ανεξάρτητος
John is very independent; she doesn't need help from her parents.

naughty (adj): behaving badly άτακτος, σκανταλιάρης
It was naughty of Tom to tell us a lie.

outgoing (adj): friendly, enjoys company
εξωστρεφής, κοινωνικός
She is outgoing and has many friends.

personality (n): one's character and nature
προσωπικότητα
She has a friendly personality and is very popular.

rely on (v): to trust someone to do something
βασίζομαι σε
I'll definitely come to help you; you can rely on me.

responsible (adj): behaving in a reliable way,
trustworthy υπεύθυνος, άξιος εμπιστοσύνης
You can rely on Sue; she's a responsible girl.

selfish (adj): caring only about yourself εγωιστικός,
εγωιστής
It was selfish not to share your sweets with the other children.

shy (adj): quiet and nervous around other people
ντροπαλός
He was shy about singing in front of the whole school.

put away: to put in the correct place, tidy βάζω κάτι στη θέση του
The students put away their books after the lesson.

take after: to be similar in appearance / character to a family member μοιάζω
Vivian takes after her father; she is tall and outgoing.

take up: to make shorter κονταίνω (ρούχο)
These jeans are too long; can you take them up, please?

put up with: to accept something unpleasant ανέχομαι
Our teacher will not put up with noise in the class.

take down: to write / make notes καταγράφω,
ημεσιώνω
The policeman will take down your name and address.
put off: to delay, postpone αναβάλλω
They put off the wedding till the summer.
take back: to return something επιστρέφω κάτι
You have to take the book back to the library today.
take off: to remove an item of clothing βγάζω (ρούχο)
It's very hot in the restaurant; take off your jacket.
put on: to wear φορώ
It's cold outside, so put on your sweater.
take out: to invite someone as your guest βγάζω
κάποιον έξω, πηγαίνω κάποιον βόλτα
His parents will take him out to a restaurant for his
birthday.

Collocations and Expressions

sense of humour: a liking for jokes and laughter
αίσθηση του χιούμορ
She has a good sense of humour and likes to tell
jokes.
get a haircut: to have your hair cut κουρεύομαι
My hair is so long and untidy; I have to get a haircut.
make an impression: to have an effect on a person
κάνω εντύπωση
If you make a good impression in the interview, you
will get the job.
look like: to be similar in appearance μοιάζω
They are brothers, but they don't look like each other.
keep (my) promise: to do what you said you would do
κρατώ την υπόσχεσή μου
You have to keep your promise and help me with my
homework.
hurt (somebody's) feelings: to upset someone
πληγώνω τα αισθήματα (κάποιου)
You hurt her feelings when you said her project was
boring.

You can try on this skirt to see if it fits.
wear (v): φορώ
I can't decide what to wear to the party tonight.
nervous (adj): νευρικός, ανήσυχος
Annie is very nervous about her exam next week.
upset (adj): αναστατωμένος
John was very upset when his dog died.
last (adj): τελευταίος
There is no more cola; you drank the last can.
latest (adj): ο πιο πρόσφατος
The latest James Bond film has just come to the
cinema.

size (n): μέγεθος
What size dress do you wear?
number (n): αριθμός
Can you give me your phone number, please?
sensitive (adj): ευαίσθητος
She's sensitive and is easily upset.
sensible (adj): λογικός
Be sensible and wear a warm coat when it's cold.

Idioms

have a heart of gold: to be kind and generous έχω
χρυσή καρδιά
Aunt Louisa has a heart of gold and always helps her
friends and family.
give a hand: to help somebody δίνω ένα χέρι,
βοηθώ
My grandma gives my mum a hand with the children
sometimes.
keep an eye on: to watch over, look after προσέχω,
παρακολουθώ
Our neighbour keeps an eye on our house when we
are away on holiday.
keep a straight face: to look serious when you want to
laugh συγκρατώ τα γέλια μου
I tried to keep a straight face when my dog licked my
friend's ice-cream.
